Neighborhood teams for vulnerable people

- At least in 83% of all Dutch municipalities
- Targets Groups differ per municipality.
- Social workers, community nurses, mental healthcare professionals etc.

We study neighborhood teams in Rotterdam focused on people with multiple problems.

• people who experience various combinations of e.g., mental illness, intellectual disability, acquired brain injury, physical disability, behavioral difficulties, homelessness, social isolation, family dysfunction, and addiction.

Different perspectives on care and support

- 1. An individual versus a systemic perspective on the client
- 2. A focus on self-expressed needs of clients or professionally assessed (normative) needs.
- 3. Client-directed or caregiver-directed care.
- 4. Client as victim of circumstances or responsible for circumstances.
- 5. A focus on barriers or on opportunities.
